## TRANSFORMING OUR PAIN

Laurie Ulrich has already shared with some of us a daily devotion that she ran across, but during these times of pandemic, the words are worth sharing yet again. “Transforming Our Pain” was written by Richard Rohr for his book *Daily Meditation*, specifically for September 18, 2020. These meditations are adapted from his book: *Dancing Standing Still: Healing the World from a Place of Prayer*, Paulist Press, 2014, 78-80. The basic message is do not deny pain nor project it elsewhere, but transform it into something helpful and productive.

*“If I were to name the Christian religion, I would probably call it ‘The Way of the Wound.’ Jesus agrees to be the Wounded One, and we Christians are these strange believers in a wounded healer. We come to God not through our strength but through our weakness. We learn wisdom and come to God not by doing it all right but through doing it all wrong.*

*“If you were going to create a religion, would you think of creating, as your religious image, a naked, bleeding, wounded man? It is the most unlikely image for God, the most illogical image for Omnipotence. None of us in our wildest imagination would have come up with it. It must expose a central problem of human existence, for*

*God to come into the world in this form and in this way. Sadly, we Christians have become accustomed to the cross—perhaps we have domesticated it—and we no longer receive the shock and the scandal of all that this image of failure is saying. Being wounded, suffering, and dying are the quickest and most sure paths to truly living.*

*“Using a scapegoat is our much-preferred method. We deny our pain, sins, and suffering and project them elsewhere. This ancient method still works so well that there is no reason to think it is going to end or change. Until we are enlightened by grace, we don’t even see it; it remains safely hidden in the unconscious where it plays itself out. Once we spot and stop the pattern, the game is over. The cross of Jesus was a mirror held up to history, so we could spot the scapegoating pattern and then stop participating in it.*

*“Only the Great Self, the True Self, the Godself, can carry the anxiety within us. The little self can’t do it. People who don’t pray can’t live the Gospel because the self is not strong enough to hold the anxiety and the fear. **If we do not transform our pain, we will always transmit it.** Always someone else has to suffer because we don’t know how to suffer; that’s what it comes down to.*

*“Most people are like electric wires: what comes in is what goes out. Someone calls us a name, and we call*

them a name back. That is, most people pass on the same energy that is given to them. Now compare an electric wire to those big, grey transformers that you see on utility poles. Dangerous current or voltage comes in, but something happens inside that grey box and what comes out is, in fact, now helpful and productive. That is exactly what Jesus does with suffering.

“That is what Jesus did: he did not return the negative energy directed at him—not during his life nor when he hung on the cross. He held it inside and made it into something much better. That is how ‘he took away the sin of the world.’ He refused to pass it on! Until the world understands that, there will be no new world.”

## SESSION REPORT

### Regular Session Meeting, September 21, 2020

As I reported last month, our Session participated in a joint meeting conversation on September 8, 2020, with the Session of Calvary United Protestant Church, Park Forest, and Presbytery of Chicago Executive Presbyter Susan Krummel regarding the possibility of sharing the pastoral services of a single pastor. This new pastor would be called by both congregations, and the Terms of Call would be shared. In effect, both congregations would have a part-time call that, when combined, would equal a full-time call. There are many details that need to be worked through. Our Session voted to begin conversations with Calvary’s Session under the guidance of our respective representatives on the Commission on Ministry. Our initial preference is to have a yoked relationship with a shared called pastor while maintaining our separate church campus facilities. We will see where this style of God’s ministry takes us in this upside down world of unrelenting viral contamination.

Session accepted with regret and thanks the resignation from the Pastoral Nominating Committee of Emily Hanley, effective immediately. Also, Joyce Anders is taking a reprieve for rest from the work of the PNC.

At the request of the Clerk of Session, who also maintains the official rolls and registers for the church, Session voted to remove seventeen names from the Baptized Member Roll. These “children” are mostly over the age of 15 years old or out of contact, along with their parents who disappeared, transferred to another church, or became inactive in the life of our church.

## FROM THE PASTOR

Halloween’s coming! We certainly feel as if this pandemic has played a nasty **trick** on us and it’s no **treat**. -  Remember the Saints in your life and our life as a congregation and what it is about them you appreciate.
-  For the week before and after Halloween, whenever you communicate with people, especially people connected to our congregation, greet them as “saint” followed by their name.

I received an 85-page breakdown of our water usage from the Village's Water Department that includes hour by hour, daily usage for the month of June and have been reviewing the details to find the reason for our high water bill. The water meter is being monitored weekly.

### STEWARDSHIP/FINANCE MINISTRY TEAM

The Presbytery of Chicago has requested our church remit the 2020 Per Capita Apportionment. To date, we have received only \$2,345 of the \$3,729 that is due, or approximately 38 members who have not yet sent in their Per Capita. Are you one of them? This is the last call for your Per Capita payments, which are **\$36.00** per active member. Please send your checks for Per Capita to the Church Office using P.O. Box 1519. Thank you.

The Payroll Protection Program Loan Forgiveness Form will be submitted through our bank to the Small Business Administration for approval in October. We qualify for the loan forgiveness, but we have to prove to the SBA that we met all the requirements.

The Presbyterian Foundation has materials and services that help small congregations like ours to set up an account for on-line giving. Sending an offering to this account electronically and securely will save you time and checks and stamps all from the comfort and safety of your home. We will keep you informed when we can successfully set this system up.

As usual for summer months, July and August were very light on general offerings. No Required Minimum Distributions were received during these months. We need an average income of **\$4,000** each week to fund our mission and operate our church. This is inclusive of pledges and identified giving as well as other income sources. So, how are we doing?

These are the things that fill my life—and the lives of those people I care about—right now. It’s been interesting to discover how I live through these times. I say “discover” because I’ve been surprised at myself, sometimes, and grateful to find out that I really AM fine. In spite of my being someone who likes to feel that I’m making decisions that control my life and my living in a time that makes it so obvious that that’s impossible, I’ve been glad to find out that I’m fine with it all.

Like everyone else, I have so much more “discretionary” time right now. I’ve used that time to read more, think more, write more, pray more, reach out more. Even though I am still doing the “isolation thing” because of COVID, I don’t feel at all isolated. I have, as most everyone in my circle of acquaintances and friends knows only too well, learned a lot more about how to be in touch with people through many of the technological means we have at our disposal these days. I would have said I’m not much interested in digital communication—before it was forced on me because I had to find alternative ways to do the things I needed to do. Now I have skills I’d never thought I would!

I find myself more able to take a “long view” and to accept the reality that this seemingly-endless state of confusion and forced inactivity will end. At some point, it will be something in our past, something we look back on and recall as a time that changed our society and ourselves in ways we don’t know yet. I am keenly aware that God’s time is not my time, and that six months (or a year, or two years, or whatever it takes) is such a negligible amount of time when considering God’s plan for us humans.

What is that? I couldn’t even presume to guess! But I’m glad to discover that I’m okay with that and that, in all the ways that matter, all is well.
