WHAT IS PENTECOST?

Pentecost is Sunday, May 20, this year. Pentecost in Christianity comes 50 days after Easter. *Pentecost* literally means 50.

In May of 2015, Wendy Thomas Russell wrote for PBS NewsHour, “*From a historical perspective, Christianity didn’t start with Jesus’ birth, his death, or even his storied ascension to heaven. It started with Pentecost—the day the ‘Holy Spirit’ entered a room holding Jesus’ apostles and entered each of them, an event which*” marks the birthday of the church. According to Rev. Dr. Mark D. Roberts (of St. Mark Presbyterian Church of Boerne, Texas, 2011), “*For Christians, Pentecost is a holiday on which we commemorate the coming of the Holy Spirit on the early followers of Jesus. Before the events of the first Pentecost, which came a few weeks after Jesus’ death and resurrection, there were followers of Jesus, but no movement that could be meaningfully called ‘the church’. Thus, from an historical point of view, Pentecost is the day on which the church was started. This is also true from a spiritual perspective, since the Spirit brings the church into existence and enlivens it. Thus Pentecost is the church’s birthday.*” patheos.com/blogs

Wendy Thomas Russell explains her back story this way: “*At his Last Supper, Jesus legendarily instructed*

his 12 disciples to go out into the world to minister and heal the sick on their own. It was at that point that they became ‘apostles’. Fifty days after Jesus’ death, as the story goes, the Holy Spirit (part of the Holy Trinity—God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit) descended onto the apostles, making them speak in foreign tongues. This ‘Pentecostal’ experience allowed the apostles direct communication with God, which signaled a major shift in the religious landscape and laid the foundation for what would become Christianity.” She further explained her definitions for the men and their number. When Judas committed suicide out of shame for his betrayal of Jesus to His capture and crucifixion, “*that left only 11 apostles, so the remaining 11 voted in a replacement: Matthias. Matthias was there during the Pentecost, which means he become holy without ever having been a disciple.*”

Rev. Dr. Mark D. Roberts retells the events of that day this way: “*What actually happened on that day of Pentecost? This event is recorded in the New Testament book known as The Acts of the Apostles. Chapter 2 begins, ‘And when the day of Pentecost...had come, [the first followers of Jesus] were all together in one place’ (2:1). All of a sudden, a sound came from heaven, like a strong wind, filling the house where the people had gathered. Something like tongues of fire rested on their heads. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and*

began to speak in other languages as the Spirit gave them the ability to speak' (2:4). ...The languages spoken by the early Christians were intelligible (not other worldly) and were heard by thousands of Jewish pilgrims who had come to Jerusalem to celebrate Shavuot. The content of the miraculous messages had to do with God's mighty works (2:11). Many who heard these messages in their own languages were amazed, though others thought the Christians were just drunk (2:12). At some point, Peter, one of the leading followers of Jesus, stood up and preached his first sermon. He interpreted the events of that morning in light of a prophecy of the Hebrew prophet Joel. In that text, God promised to pour out his Spirit on all flesh, empowering diverse people to exercise divine power. This would be a sign of the coming 'day of the Lord' (Acts 2:16-21; Joel 2:28-32). Peter went on to explain that Jesus had been raised and had poured out the Spirit in fulfillment of God's promise through Joel (2:32-33). When the crowd asked what they should do, Peter urged them to turn their lives around and be baptized in the name of Jesus. Then they would be forgiven and would receive the gift of the Holy Spirit (2:37-39). Acts reports that about 3000 people were added to the church that day (2:41). Not a bad response to Peter's first sermon!"

Rev. Roberts also sermonizes: "Each Christian needs to ask: Am I serving God through the power of the Spirit? Am I exercising the gifts of the Spirit in my life, both in the gathered church and as I live for God in the world? Pentecost is a time to ask God to fill us afresh with the Spirit so that we might join in the ministry of Christ with gusto. And it is a time to renew our commitment to fulfilling our crucial role in the ministry of God's people in the world."

May 20th is Pentecost. We encourage all to wear red as a sign of the flames of the Spirit on the apostles or of the blood of martyrs. Join us for worship that Sunday at 10:30 a.m. as we remember the birth of the Christian Church and the way that the Holy Spirit empowered the disciples to proclaim Jesus as Messiah! It all started with the disciples gathered in prayer. It makes one wonder just what might happen when we worship, pray, and share Communion together. **Come, Spirit, Come!**

SESSION REPORT

Special Congregational Meeting, April 8, 2018

In the absence of Clerk Lauren Ulrich, Edward Wahl was elected Clerk pro tem for the meeting. Elder Kathie Darman presented the report of the Nominating Committee to nominate Karen Maurer to fill a vacancy in the Session Class of 2020. With no other candidates, Rev. Elvery declared her election by acclamation.

Regular Session Meeting, April 9, 2018

In the absence of Clerk Lauren Ulrich, Edward Wahl was elected Clerk pro tem for the meeting.

Rev. Elvery included these items in his report:

- ✚ Officiated the funeral service for Active Member/Ruling Elder/Deacon/Trustee Marvin L. Austin at the church on Saturday, April 14, 2018.
- ✚ Presented a request from Elder Betty Owens for her son and a friend to play music for the congregation at Heavenly Perks on Sunday, May 20, 2018. The request was approved.
- ✚ Noted that the Presbytery's Commission on Ministry must approve his request to enter training for Transition Ministry at a COM meeting on April 10.
- ✚ Updated the current status of the South Suburban Ministerial Association.

Clerk Ulrich stated in her written report receiving notification of the death of Active Member/Ruling Elder/Deacon/Trustee Marvin L. Austin on Wednesday, April 4, 2018. Church rolls show Marv was the 5th longest continuing Active Member, having joined the congregation on March 7, 1948.

Ministry highlights:

Congregational Life Ministry:

An estimated 55 persons enjoyed the Easter Breakfast and following Heavenly Perks on Sunday, April 1, 2018. The Annual Ice Cream Social is tentatively scheduled for Sunday, July 8, 2018.

Faith Formation Christian Education Ministry:

Rev. Elvery appointed Elder Karen Maurer to lead this area of church ministry.

Monday Night Dinner Ministry:

Elder Shirley Armistead reported that a large shipment of donated frozen food items was received on Sunday, April 15, 2018, to be used for coming menus for several weeks. This is the second such donation received.

Personnel & Administration Ministry:

A policy question regarding out-of-state non-member use of our church sanctuary for weddings was covered.

Stewardship & Finance Ministry:

With the approval of the 2018 Church Budget by Session in March, Elders Ed Wahl and Donna Moore reported that the monthly reports to Session are now in the new budget format. The Ministry Team has been notified that our present Church Financial Recording Secretary Dan Hamilton will not be continuing in his position after 2018, and a search for his replacement must begin. The annual audit of the 2017 financial records will occur soon.

Worship Ministry:

Elder Kathie Darman thanked Deacon Laura Dillman for decorating the sanctuary with palms and Easter flowers. The following dates for Communion for 2018-2019 were presented and approved, as follows:

2018—May 20 (Pentecost); June 3; July 1; August 5; September 2; October 7 (World Wide Communion); November 4 (All Saints Day); December 2 (1st Sunday of Advent); December TBA (Still Night); and December 24 (Christmas Eve).
2019—January 6 (Epiphany); February 3; March 3; March 6 (Ash Wednesday); April 18 (Maundy Thursday); April 23 (Easter); May 5; and June 9 (Pentecost).

With the coming 160th anniversary of the church in December, there has been some interest expressed in having a low-key observance and celebration. Any persons interested in planning for this event should contact Rev. Elvery.

TRUSTEE REPORT

The Trustees have awarded the contract for replacing the roof systems on our buildings. The shingle color will be pewter gray, which is not too different from the current one. One issue that must be solved before we begin is to tuckpoint (or demolish) the chimney on the Aki Garden wall of the Christian Ed building. There is water leaking into the building, the existing roof decking is damaged, and no solution to the problem is inexpensive. It is thought that a more thorough inspection by our insurance adjuster would have uncovered the problem. The lavalier microphone used by Pastor Elvery is working much better now with the new batteries. The need for greater security at our exterior boiler room door for our Monday Night Dinners was discussed. It was decided that we would install a viewing tube to enable those inside to see who needs to be allowed in through that door. Jay Ruklic



STEWARDSHIP/FINANCE MINISTRY TEAM

We are doing well for receiving your Per Capita through March, with 60% of the payments received so far. The amount is **\$33.61** per active member, including confirmed youth who are now full members of the congregation. If you have not paid your Per Capita for 2018, please send it to the church office or bring it to church

on a Sunday and put your envelope in the offering plate. Thank you to all who have paid through March and to those who paid in April. If someone does not pay his or her Per Capita share, then someone else has to pay double to cover it for that person or family.

Have you remembered our church in your will or estate plan with a specific amount or percentage amount bequest? Sadly, we can count on the fingers of one hand the number of our deceased members since 2000 who have included a bequest to our church in their estate plan or will. Let your blessings from God continue to work in God's behalf long beyond your own days.

With the changes for 2018 in the new IRS tax laws, it is more beneficial than ever before to contribute to the church using tax free direct transfers from your investments and retirement plans. You can meet your pledge in this manner. Why pay unnecessary taxes when you don't have to? Giving data will be provided weekly to the Secretary by the Counting Teams. The Secretary will periodically run individual giving statements that will be handed out or mailed to our members. The Secretary will keep records of pledges received and Per Capita payments. The normal weekly time commitment is less than two hours. Interested persons are asked to contact Donna Moore or Edward Wahl, co-chairs of the Ministry Team. Please give prayerful consideration to serving your church with this vital gift of personal stewardship.

Circle Faith Formation: Our congregation actually does several things that fall under the heading of faith formation, all of which are planned to help participants grow in faith. We usually think of the Women's Circles as having their primary focus on service and the social support relationship that grows. But both our Circles have a long history of studying a Biblical book or some aspect of a life of faith. A memorable study undertaken by Rebecca Circle was the book, *The Faith Club*, in which three women—one Christian, one Jewish, and one Muslim—struggle together to understand how to talk to their children about their own and other faiths. For a few years now, both Circles have used *Horizons Bible Study*, the Presbyterian women's study published annually. Many in our congregation used *Who Is Jesus?* of two years ago in small groups as well as an all-church retreat led by Deb Way at Irons Oaks. The New Testament book of Revelation was the *Horizons* study book several years ago, when Char Hansen, study chair for Lydia Circle, helped everyone on retreat to a deeper understanding of this mysterious book.
