# EASTER CHANGES EVERYTHING

## BELIEVE IN THE RESURRECTION

Easter this year falls on April 1<sup>st</sup>. The worship celebration is for the risen Christ, the resurrection of Jesus from the tomb after crucifixion on the cross. Happily we shout, "Alleluia!" We fill the chancel of the sanctuary will colorful spring flowers, signs of rebirth from the earth. We believe in the resurrection; yet, we daily need reminders of it. Carol Carretto pointed out some of the reminders in Blessed Are You Who Believed:

*"When the world seems a defeat for God and you are sick with the disorder, the violence, the terror, the war on the streets; when the earth seems to be chaos, say to yourself: 'Jesus died and rose again on purpose to save, and his salvation is already with us.'*

*Every departing missionary  
is an act of faith in the resurrection.*

*Every peace treaty  
is an act of faith in the resurrection.*

*Every agreed commitment  
is an act of faith in the resurrection.*

*When you forgive your enemy,  
When you feed the hungry,*

*When you defend the weak,  
you believe in the resurrection.*

*When you have the courage to marry,  
When you welcome the newly born child,  
When you build your home,  
you believe in the resurrection.*

*When you wake at peace in the morning,  
When you sing to the rising sun,  
When you go to work with joy,  
you believe in the resurrection.*

The words of a song say, "I am crucified with Christ; therefore, I no longer live. Jesus Christ now lives in me." The seeming contradiction here is overcome when the word "I" is understood to be "the Self." Reinhold Niebuhr writes, "If we are drawn out of ourselves into love of neighbor and love of Christ, we truly live. Life is a perpetual Lent and Easter."

## SESSION REPORT

### Regular Session Meeting, March 19, 2018

Session met on March 19<sup>th</sup>. From Rev. Elvery's report, he intends to take a week of Continuing Education time May 7-11, 2018, to attend Transitional Ministry Training. He will not preach on May 13 and will work with Worship Ministry to obtain pulpit supply.

With mixed emotions, Session received and accepted an e-mail resignation from Laurel Hamilton as Ruling Elder effective March 12, 2018. As she begins her new pastoral position at Range Line Presbyterian Church in Hebron, Indiana, on March 19, she will no longer serve as a Ruling Elder here. We will miss her terribly, but pray for all good things as she begins this new phase in her faith journey. Congratulations, Laurel.

Ministry highlights:

#### Congregational Life Ministry:

Elders Jan Bunker and Shirley Armistead highlighted the Easter Breakfast on April 1<sup>st</sup> from 9-10 a.m. in Westminster Hall. Assistance is needed from all members... setting up, bringing food, serving, cleaning up. Although many of us have places to go following the service or we have company arriving at our homes, we should attempt to pull together, if at all possible, to make this breakfast happen. Any help (big or small) will be greatly appreciated! The good news is we can serve any leftovers from the breakfast at Session Heavenly Perks! Set up for the Easter Breakfast will be at 1 p.m. on Saturday, March 31. ***Please don't forget to look at the Easter Breakfast sign-up sheet located on the Welcome Center in the Narthex.***

#### Faith Formation Ministry:

Rev. Elvery is working with Karen Maurer to include a "Moment with Children" during worship during Easter-tide.

#### Mission/Outreach Ministry:

Session received the information from Church World Service regarding opportunities to provide Hygiene Kits and/or School Kits during 2018. At this point, we have not heard anything about Chicago Presbytery planning to have a "Harvest" event and would need to send our kits by ourselves if they do not plan one. CWS requests a \$2 processing fee per kit, and we have typically assembled 40+ kits. Approximate mailing and processing costs: \$150. Rev. Elbery will check to see if the Presbytery is planning to have a Harvest Event to send kits

from the entire Presbytery. The decision on whether or not we will participate in this effort will be discussed at April's Session meeting.

#### Monday Night Dinner Ministry:

As Laurel has now officially begun her pastorate at Range Line Presbyterian Church in Hebron, Indiana, she is no longer able to chair the dinners. Elder Laurie Ulrich announced that Char Hansen is looking forward to—maybe in 10-12 weeks—being able to coordinate the Monday Night Dinners. Laurel will put everything on paper for her and will stop by Char's home in a couple of weeks to go over everything.

#### Personnel & Administration Ministry:

Elder Kathleen O'Hanlon announced that Ginny Coppess' group of line dancers is "grandfathered-in" at their old rates for parties since they make contributions above and beyond what we ask for as monthly room usage. Session approved Bright Start's use of the sanctuary for one of their recognition ceremonies, verifying that Johnnie Dorsey got paid for working the event.

#### Stewardship & Finance Ministry:

Session accepted a revision of the monthly report form. The co-chairs, Elders Donna Moore and Ed Wahl, submitted a recommended 2018 budget. The February Treasurer's Report was presented and approved.

#### Worship Ministry:

Elders Kathie Darman and Betty Owens reported efforts to get Communion servers, weekly liturgists, and proof readers for Sunday bulletins. Laura Dillman ordered palms and Easter flowers and arranged for the bulletin insert. A Worship Design Team was organized to plan Maundy Thursday and Easter Sunday services.

Session discussed the denominational 2018 Shared Mission Giving pledge. As we are currently donating our "mission" moneys more frequently to local projects, such as Monday Night Dinners, we voted to return our Shared Mission Pledge form with a \$0 pledge for 2018.

Session received a request to fly the Rainbow Flag as a demonstration of our openness and inclusion. We are anxious to be perceived as an open and inclusive congregation, but decided to include a demonstration of our intentional inclusiveness on our website rather than to fly the Rainbow Flag.

Session discussed the appropriateness of requiring socially acceptable behavior boundaries for all members. We affirmed all members' right and responsibility to speak to any member about appropriateness when required.

Because Session has not received any indication from congregation members that a commemoration of our 160<sup>th</sup> Anniversary is something we want to do, an announcement will be made to encourage anyone who desires to commemorate this event to speak to Rev. Elvery.

The Stewardship & Finance Ministry Team opened a discussion of the recommended 2018 budget. The team was unable to have the budget ready for our Annual Congregational Meeting because the figures needed for the Transition Expenses (i.e., the change from Rev. Dederer to a new pastoral leader) were unavailable. Now that those approximate figures can be included, the budget was presented and approved. Copies of the 2018 Budget can be found on the Welcome Center.

Session is calling a **Congregational Meeting for Sunday, April 8, 2018**, immediately after worship for the purpose of hearing the report of the Nominating Committee regarding the Ruling Elder vacancy left by Laurel's move to Range Line. If their nomination is elected, we will have *installation* of our new Ruling Elder on April 15.

Session members took some time before the actual meeting to discuss the Ministry Information Form that is required of us as we begin the L-O-N-G process of moving through the transition to a new pastor. Don't think we are not working on this—Rev. Elvery is guiding us along at the appropriate pace. We are still planning to meet with Chicago Heights Presbyterian Church to see what they are thinking in regard to “shared resources,” which is a phrase they used when approaching us for a conversation. We'll let you know when there is anything to share with you. At this point, just be assured we are taking the necessary steps, slow though they may be! We earnestly seek your prayers that we will be open to God's leading as we move forward.




### FROM THE PASTOR

**Practice**, both a verb and a noun, has been in use for a long time. The choir *practices* (verb) long hours at choir *practice* (noun). Internship and residency allow doctors to *practice* (verb) before they set up their own *practice* (noun). In the last two decades in the business and the church, conversation about “best practices” surfaces more and more as a way of talking about not only what but how things should be done correctly. Along

with that has come a resurgence of considering “spiritual practices.”

Why “spiritual practices” and why now? Many who love and observe the church at large see that we have become too much of a business or social gathering and too little of a faith community. If we want to stay true to our calling and tap into the deep soil of faith, watered by the life-giving streams of the Spirit, then we need to find ways to do that. Too many of our practices (noun) have little or no spiritual grounding. John's Gospel appears in the readings for Eastertide. One of John's images is of the vine and the branches and that if the branches are cut off from the vine, they wither and die. At the risk of over-simplifying things, our constant worry about churches dying may lead us right to John's understanding. If this analysis rings true, then seeking ways to reconnect to the vine is imperative. We can't go back to what we've always done because that's how we got cut off in the first place! We must find new, or renewed, ways of reconnecting to the vine, our source of life, God in Jesus Christ.



Spiritual practices, actions that become life-giving habits, are our way forward. Whether we deepen our prayer life or take it on anew, reclaim or strengthen our engagement with God's word, or quiet and focus ourselves through discernment, we renew our deep and abiding connections with the Almighty, our Creator. Since we earnestly want to find God's future for us, we also will deepen our relationship with the God who breaks out of boxes and shines brightly on the horizon.

## LAUREL HAMILTON'S ORDINATION

*"I would like to invite each and every member of First Presbyterian Church of Homewood to my ordination on Sunday, April 22, 2018, at 4:00 p.m. It will be held at Range Line Presbyterian Church in Hebron, IN. This congregation has nurtured me, challenged me, and loved me to help get me to this point, and it would be so meaningful to have as many of you as possible to join in the service and celebration." – Laurel Hamilton*

Over the years, the ordination of Ruling Elders and Deacons has been a routine part of our worship services as new persons are elected each year to serve as our church officers. Over 50% of our current active members have been so ordained. What is not routine is the ordination of one of our members to the office of Teaching Elder. Now, for only the second time in at least 40 years, our dear friend Active Member/Ruling Elder/Trustee Laurel Hamilton is in the final stage of preparation for her coming ordination as a Teaching Elder. Many of us still remember when Rebecca Montgomery followed this calling in 2008.

To accept Laurel's invitation above, Session will encourage a car caravan leaving from our church parking lot on Sunday, April 22<sup>nd</sup>, at 2:00 p.m. Members who can drive and who have extra seats are encouraged to car-pool other members who do not or can not wish to drive an hour each way. A sheet will be available on the Welcome Center to sign up as drivers or passengers.



*The Book of Order* is very specific regarding the manner and conduct of the service of ordination / installation. So we can understand what will happen at the service, we can learn what is specified, as follows:

### *G-2.0805 – Installation Service*

When the congregation, the presbytery, and the teaching elder (or candidate) have all concurred in a call to a permanent or designated pastoral position, the presbytery shall complete the call process by organizing and conducting a service of installation. Installation is an act of the presbytery establishing the pastoral relationship. A service of installation occurs in the context of worship. The order for that service of worship in the Directory for Worship (W-4.4000) shall be followed.

### *W-4.4001a – Ordination and Installation*

In ordination the church sets apart with prayer and the laying on of hands those who have been called through election by the church to serve as deacons, ruling elders, and teaching elders. (W-2.1005) In installation the church sets apart with prayer those previously ordained ...

### *W-4.4001b – Service of Ordination, Installation, and Commissioning*

The service of ordination and installation for ... teaching elders ... shall focus upon Christ and the joy and responsibility in serving him through the mission and ministry of the church, and shall include a sermon appropriate to the occasion. The teaching elder presiding shall state briefly the nature of the ministry.

### *W-4.4002 – Setting of the Service*

The service of ordination and installation ... may take place during the Service for the Lord's Day as a response to the proclamation of the Word. (W-3.3503) Ordination and installation ... may also take place in a special service that focuses upon Jesus Christ and the mission and ministry of the church and which includes the proclamation of the Word. The service of ordination or installation of a teaching elder shall be conducted at a convenient time to enable the substantial participation of the presbytery.

### *W-4.4003 – Constitutional Questions for Ordination, Installation, and Commissioning*

The moderator of the council of those to be ordained, installed, or commissioned shall ask them to stand before the body of membership and to answer the following questions: [The first eight questions are common to all who are to be ordained as ruling elders, deacons, and teaching elders. There is one set of questions, however, that is unique for a teaching elder.]

*Will you be a faithful teaching elder, proclaiming the good news in Word and Sacrament, teaching faith and caring for people? Will you be active in government and discipline, serving in the councils of the church; and in your ministry will you try to show the love and justice of Jesus Christ?*

From this you can see that the service of ordination and installation for Laurel Hamilton at Range Line Presbyterian Church is a presbytery event rather than a local congregation event. The moment she becomes **The Rev. Laurel Hamilton** she ceases to be a member of our congregation and becomes a member of Wabash Valley Presbytery. Ed Wahl

## TRUSTEE REPORT



The Trustees have received bids from three companies for replacement of the roofs on our entire facility. The roofing systems had been damaged by wind and hail in 2017, and our insurance is covering all of the cost except for our deductible. A contractor has been selected, and the work is expected to begin in April. The color chosen for the replacement shingles is a pewter gray, which is not much different from the current color. Other repairs are on-going. A problem involving the lock on the elevator vestibule door has been addressed. The sump pump alarm on the unit adjacent to the south stairway to Westminster Hall keeps activating, which has been determined to mean that a battery needs replacing. The Trustees are still working toward ensuring that the toilet in the Westminster Hall women's restroom works properly. Our elevator is working well and is due for a mandatory inspection and pressure test very soon. We are also working on acquiring a replacement computer server to enable network connectivity among the staff. Jay Ruklic

## STEWARDSHIP/FINANCE MINISTRY TEAM

We now have a Church Budget for 2018! The budget process took two to three months longer than normal because of a few factors. First, we began 2018 with the final week of Rev. Nancy Jo Dederer's employment, with special expenses for her celebration and total unknowns regarding the type and cost of replacement pastoral services. Second, we had to conduct our 2018 pledge requests to determine the level of financial support we can expect from our members going forward into the period of transition. Third, we were working with our Church Treasurer to develop a new budget format that is more closely in line with accounting practices and is compatible with Quickbooks. Fourth, we needed help from the Board of Pensions in defining our new (reduced) level of mandatory contributions while our pastor's position is vacant. Session voted to approve the 2018 Church Budget at the March 19, 2018, meeting. Copies of the approved budget are available on the Welcome Center; feel free to take one.

To date, we have received 40 responses out of the 103 mailed for our 2018 pledges. The combined total pledge amount is \$113,346. In retrospect, these numbers correspond to 51 responses and \$125,460 in 2017, both of which are higher. There is still time to send or bring in your response envelope if you are among those who have not yet done so. Thank you to all.

Thank you to all who have already paid the 2018 Per Capita amount and to those who have pledged to do so. The amount per active member is **\$33.61**. Through February we have received \$2,720.82, which is 52.6% of the total \$5,175.94 owed. Please use the special Per Capita envelope in your offering envelope box if you are sending in your payment, and please write "per capita" on the memo line of your check.


