
"Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." 2 Corinthians 9:7

ATRUSTEE REPORT



The Trustees met on November 8, 2022. No report of the business conducted was sent to the editor.

△STEWARDSHIP/FINANCE MINISTRY TEAM

If you used the Thanksgiving Offering envelope in your box of stewardship envelopes, here is an explanation of where the money goes. The Pastor's Discretionary Fund is a special fund outside of our operating budget that is used to help congregation members and folks in our community in times of deep need. We have used these funds to pay for utilities, mortgages, medical treatment, counseling, educational needs, and food. These financial gifts become a sign of hope for people who feel their back against a wall or whose financial savings are depleted, who have nowhere left to turn or whose circumstances have changed dramatically. The gifts meet both physical and spiritual needs, reminding people that they are not alone and that *nothing* can separate them from God's love in Christ. The special Thanksgiving Offering is one way you can help support the Pastor's Discretionary Fund. You can still use that envelope! Make your check payable to First Presbyterian Church of Homewood with "Pastor's Discretionary Fund" on the memo line. These (identified) gifts are tax deductible and will be included on your year-end statement. Please consider how you might support the ministry of Jesus Christ to your church family and our community.

In your box of offering envelopes for December, there are four regular Sunday offering envelopes, a special Christmas Offering envelope, and a special Christmas Joy Offering envelope. These are all different and serve different purposes. *Christmas Joy* is the most misunderstood. This special offering is one of four churchwide Special Offerings of the Presbyterian Church (USA), and its purpose is to benefit church workers in need: retired, current, and future.

Please help! *Christmas Joy* asks that we think beyond our congregation, as

we do not retain any of this money. Think younger (schools and colleges), think older (pensions), and think bias-free (leadership). Think about **JOY**. [There is also a Christmas Offering. Please do not confuse the two.]

Last Reminder!

There is a Monday, December 26, 2022, deadline for each of the following categories for 2022 charitable giving to the church to be included in your 2022 federal and state tax returns:

1. If you are an annual pledge member and have not yet paid your 2022 pledge.

- 2. If you are behind and are completing your 2022 pledge.
- 3. If you have a Required Minimum Distribution from an IRA that you must take for 2022 and can donate it tax-free to the church.
- 4. If you have shares of highly appreciated stock you wish to donate to the church in 2022 free of capital gains taxes and income taxes.
- 5. If you wish to make a donation to the Memorial Fund in memory of someone in 2022.
- 6. If you wish to remember the church with an extra donation above your pledge to help with our shortfall.
- 7. If you have not made a pledge in 2022 and wish to contribute to the church from your income in 2022.
- 8. If you wish to make a donation to the Mission and Ministry Endowment Fund in 2022.

All charitable contributions to the church are tax deductible to the extent provided by law.



God will surely bless all those who face walking into the unknown future with the spirit of challenge and determination in their steps toward the future.

THE CHRISTMAS WREATH

(The Old Farmer's Almanac, Robert B Thomas, 2022)



"Whatever your family traditions are, at its very core, a wreath celebrates the cyclical nature of life. This time of year, Christmas wreaths are hung in every place imaginable—from doors and fences to lampposts and windows—even the front grille of the car! How did a round bit of greenery

come to symbolize the holidays?

"Wreaths are part of many ancient traditions dating back to the earliest civilizations. The circle is a symbol of immortality; throughout history, wreaths have been associated with life, rejuvenation, and renewal. Originally, wreaths were worn around the head, neck, or waist. The Greeks awarded laurel wreaths to their triumphant athletes; in the Persian Empire, they were worn on the head as a symbol of importance; and ancient Romans wore them like crowns. In Sweden, candles were incorporated in the wreaths to celebrate the return of light after the winter solstice. Nowadays, we use them in a window or on a door as a sign of welcome during the holidays. They can be used flat on a table for decoration or as an advent wreath, which also contains candles, one for each Sunday between Thanksgiving and Christmas."
