SESSION REPORT

Whenever two churches undertake a mission together, there are bound to be twists and turns that seem to be obstacles or burdens or problems. On the other side, there are reasons for happiness, acceptance, solutions, and good faith. Such is the case as our yoking team works with their counterparts at Calvary United Protestant Church, Park Forest. Recently, a side issue came up that served as a brief distraction, but our Session reaffirmed our intention to stay moving forward with Calvary without the confusion of the distraction.

As will be discussed in this issue of *The Carillon*, we have been neglecting the customary special offerings as they come and go during the year. Session voted to receive special offerings for Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Christmas Joy, and to designate their distribution after they are received.

The 2021 Communion Schedule was approved for the first Sunday of each month. Special extra celebrations of Communion will be approved when we get closer to those dates.

Session called a **Special Meeting of the Congregation** for Sunday, December 13, 2020, at 11:30 a.m. for the purpose of receiving the report of the Nominating Committee and the election of Church Officers. See the lead article at the front of this issue of *The Carillon* for the instructions on how you can participate.

Each congregation keeps 25% of the Peace & Global Witness Special Offering to dedicate to local mission use. Session voted to send our 25% share to Jones Center in Chicago Heights to support their hunger and family needs programs.

Session was informed by Presbytery that the 2021 Per Capita Apportionment will remain unchanged from 2020 at \$36.00 per Active Member on our roll as of December 31, 2019. We had reported 111 Active Members.

The State of Illinois has a new law that requires ALL employees of entities with one or more employee to complete a course in sexual harassment training by no later than December 31, 2020. Elder Kathie Darman will be working with our four employees plus the pastor

to complete the training in December and become “in compliance.”

Christmas decorations and flowers for the sanctuary will not be purchased this year because public worship gatherings are expected to be absent. As an alternative, Session asks that you send the \$10/plant you would normally provide payable to the church as a donation in your name to **Presbyterian Disaster Assistance**. We will keep track of these gifts in celebration/gratitude/memory of others and publish them in the January issue of *The Carillon*. Just mark “PDF” on the memo line of your check and send it to the church P.O. Box 1519. Please use a separate check for this donation.

A letter of resignation from the Session was received from Ruling Elder Joyce Anders, effective immediately, from the Class of 2022. The letter was received with regret and thanks for her service.

Notification was received of the death of Tim Noetzel, brother of Ruling Elder Laurie Ulrich, on Tuesday, October 27, 2020.

As I think about the upcoming Christmas season, images I use to suggest ways we humans go through life keep popping up. I think we are either a tow truck, a bulldozer, or a

plow or some mixture of these. Tow trucks drag things behind themselves. As the amount of stuff being dragged along grows and grows, it will exceed the truck's capacity, so it stalls or breaks down. Likewise, a bulldozer pushes things ahead saying, "I'll deal with that later." Once the amount of stuff pushed off gets large enough, the bulldozer too will stall or have a breakdown. The plow cuts through the soil, turns it over, and keeps moving. Obviously, being a plow is ideal. Certainly, we all are tow trucks, bulldozers, and plows. If we don't want to bog down, or worse yet break down, then learning to be a plow seems the way to go.

TRUSTEE REPORT



The Trustees are still not holding monthly meetings, but work around the buildings goes on. The elevator was inspected, thereby satisfying state requirements. The boiler was inspected for our insurance carrier and for the State Fire Marshal. In-

door insecticide treatments have been done with ongoing pest deterrents in the boiler room and kitchen. Fall and Halloween decorations were placed by Marge Errant at the Narthex entrance and on the front porch. Halloween décor came down, with the fall decorations remaining until after Thanksgiving. Hostas have been cut down around the buildings, and since we did not have an All Church Fall Clean-up Day, our weekly lawn maintenance contractor removed weeds from parking spaces and cleaned up weeds and perennials along the east and north parking lot fence line. Johnnie Dorsey tested positive for Covid 19 and self-quarantined. The church office and entry were cleaned and disinfected. Johnnie has returned to work after testing negative and is feeling well.

Last Reminder!

There is a Wednesday, December 30, 2020, deadline for each of the following categories for 2020 charitable giving to the church to be included in your 2020 federal and state tax returns:

- 1. If you are an annual pledge member and have not yet paid your 2020 pledge.**
- 2. If you are behind and are completing your 2020 pledge.**
- 3. If you have a Required Minimum Distribution from an IRA that you must take for 2020 and can donate it tax-free to the church.**
- 4. If you have shares of highly appreciated stock you wish to donate to the church in 2020 free of capital gains taxes and income taxes.**
- 5. If you wish to make a donation to the Memorial Fund in memory of someone in 2020.**
- 6. If you wish to remember the church with an extra donation above your pledge to help with our shortfall.**
- 7. If you have not made a pledge in 2020 and wish to contribute to the church from your income in 2020.**
- 8. If you wish to make a donation to the Mission and Ministry Endowment Fund in 2020.**

All charitable contributions to the church are tax deductible to the extent provided by law.

The boxes of 2021 offering envelopes are now at the church waiting for their labels. We expect the same box numbers to be used in 2021 as in 2020. Distribution in December will be different this year because the building is not open. Your box may be hand delivered or mailed, depending on where you live.

A lifelong Presbyterian, I’m finding as the pandemic shrinks our connected world that I’ve become more local, so I’d like to share some recent experiences that have affirmed our church’s connectedness. The first was Ed Wahl’s enclosure with the stewardship letter of an offering envelope for “Peace and Global Witness” that we usually receive on World Communion Sunday. The leaflet, also enclosed, will tell you more. Please remember to use the church’s PO Box 1519, Homewood, IL, 60430 address when mailing anything to the church (not our street address). Peace and Global Witness is one of **four** national annual special offerings. The one you may know best is Palm Sunday’s One Great Hour of Sharing that has, in addition to Presbyterian congregations nationally, participation from other denominations as well. Those monies go to hunger related programs and to our Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. The third special offering is received at Pentecost—often referred to as the “birthday of the Christian church.” Fittingly, these offerings go to support the faith development of youth, children through college age.



The fourth annual special offering is called **Christmas Joy**, and it benefits church workers in need: retired, current, and future. There is a box now in our FPC office with

Christmas Joy envelopes and leaflets that may appear in your snail mailbox the next time there is an all-church mailing. Our church receives other local offerings (such as Thanksgiving), but these are the four that are called the church-wide Special Offerings of the PC(USA) that support our mission.


TUESDAY EVENING ADVENT STUDY ON ZOOM WITH DUDLEY

But kindness and good will won out, and Marla called Cokesbury, reaching Nicole who agreed to place an order for her Presbyterian colleague for three Shining Light Advent calendars. It seemed easiest to bill to my credit card, but ship to Homewood—and then the address did not match the credit card. At least it would ship to a PO Box since the church was not open. So in the next week Pastor Dudley will pick up that slim package from the Homewood post office and make in-person deliveries. Thank you, Marla, at the PC(USA) church store! Thank you, Nicole, at Cokesbury. It’s not what we usually mean by “connectionalism,” but it was alive and well last Thursday.

Presbytery of Chicago meets in Assembly, now four times a year, most recently in November at the Glen Ellyn church—but really on Zoom. Three months ago, Glen Ellyn would have seemed to me a mystery suburb somewhere northwest of Chicago, but now I have a couple of medical tests scheduled there; it’s two suburbs over from Carol Stream where I live. We didn’t gather there because of the virus—Hmmm... There were about 150 people in attendance, two of whom were Pastor Dudley and me: a teaching elder and a ruling elder as our constitution requires. The three hour Assembly began with worship that included honoring the outgoing moderator with two gifts: a box of fancy golf balls and an even fancier copy of *Roberts’ Rules of Order*. Most personally meaningful was a service of necrology, which celebrated the life, work, and passing of both teaching (ministers) and ruling elders during the year 2019 in the Presbytery of Chicago—and included our *Donna Moore* and *Darlene Giesbrecht*.

FPC Homewood is entitled to two ruling elder commissioners who do not need to be currently on Session. My term ends in December. Please let Ed Wahl know of your interest in being a commissioner in 2021, which for the present you can do in the comfort of your home.
