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## FROM THE PASTOR

As you all know, no sooner did I start my ministry with two lovely services on April 3<sup>rd</sup> than I was knocked back with a case of Covid. Certainly not how I intended to start my pastorate (certainly not right before Holy Week)! but a funny thing happened after I went down: everyone else stepped up. Of course this is not entirely a surprise; the fact that you all have endured an ongoing pandemic and weathered pastoral transitions in the midst of that (in the words of a colleague: *a luminal place within a luminal place*) is a testament to your willing and able leadership. Still, you had every excuse to fail and flail, and though there was probably flailing behind the scenes (or maybe under water like the feet of the swan churning, churning, churning while on the surface the swan looks to be gliding, untroubled by anything) Holy Week was a success, a triumph, a true witness to the resurrection. Alleluia!

Let's try to remember this as we move into the season of Easter. It's easy to get caught up with thinking about and worrying about what "needs" to be done or what "should" be done, it's easy to focus on what we're not doing but could be doing, it's easy to narrow in on what we perceive as our deficits and shortcomings, but we do not have to live like that. It's Easter! We're alive! What a gift!

Life is a gift given to us, by God, and all we have to do is the next thing. In my case, that means finishing writing this article. In your case, that means finishing reading this article. Once we're done with this thing, we'll do the next thing, and whatever that next thing is, God will work with us to make it just exactly as good as it needs to be.

## THREE SPECIAL DAYS

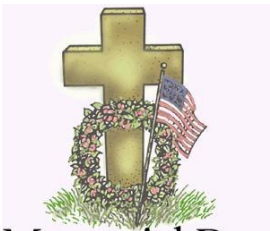

The third day is June 5, **Pentecost**. Pentecost in Christianity comes 50 days after Easter, that time period being called the season of Eastertide. (And for that reason, Pastor Lang has said that the Easter cross should stay up in the sanctuary until Pentecost.) When the Holy Spirit entered each of the gathered apostles on Pentecost, that time marks the birthday of the church. In the past, we have encouraged all to wear red as a sign of the flames of the Spirit on the apostles —so wear red all day on June 5, even if still sheltered in place. We remember the birth of the Christian Church and the way that the Holy Spirit empowered the disciples to proclaim Jesus as Messiah! It all started with the disciples gathered in prayer. It makes one wonder just what might happen when we worship, pray, and share Communion together.

## SESSION REPORT

### Regular Session Meeting, April 18, 2022

When Rev. Dudley Elvery closed his last Regular Session Meeting with prayer on Monday, December 13, 2021, he concluded his four-year run as the Teaching Elder/Moderator. Future Moderators beginning in January 2022 would have to be Interim Moderators appointed by the Presbytery of Chicago for as long as our pastor position remained unfilled. Chaplain Mike Welf became our assigned Interim Moderator for an indefinite term into the future. Then, God provided! A new called Pastor, the Rev. Matt Lang, accepted the yoked pastoral ministry in March 2022. Chaplain Welf was only here for three Regular Session Meetings and two Congregational Meetings. Pastor Matt served as Moderator of the April 18, 2022, Regular Session Meeting, his first of many to come with us. Session members greeted him with numerous bits of church and Session history to get him up to speed.

Mother's Day is coming on Sunday, May 8, 2022. Session voted to send the entire Mother's Day Special Offering to Anew (formerly the South Suburban Family Shelter) in Homewood.

The Session Elders are very pleased to see and hear the young children who are coming to church on Sunday mornings. The children participate in the celebration of Holy Communion and Moments with the Children in the worship services. Parents and grandparents are invited to bring their young family members whenever they can.

Rev. Lang endured a week of Covid-19 isolation from April 9-15, 2022, after a positive test result. He returned to lead the joint Good Friday worship service at Calvary United Protestant Church, Park Forest, on April 15, 2022, and the joint Easter worship service at First Presbyterian Church of Homewood on April 17, 2022. He thanked Ruling Elders Edward and Janet Wahl for leading the entire worship service on Palm Sunday, April 10, 2022, while he was in isolation.

Notification was received of the death of Active Member Elder/Deacon/Trustee Barbara Foerch on Sunday, April 17, 2022. Additional details for arrangements have not been determined at this time.

Notification was received of the death of the Rev. Dr. Eddie Knox, the retired pastor of Pullman Presbyterian Church, on Monday, April 11, 2022. Rev. Knox was very active in Mission Council #8 in the south suburban area.

**TRUSTEE REPORT**

At the April meeting of the Trustees, the Buildings & Grounds Committee reported that painting of the outside of the church can begin soon, with the steeple and pillars being hired out. Grounds Beautification Committee will also begin work soon. The idea of a Spring Work Day did not get much support. The kitchen refrigerator had the compressor not working—sort of fixed but being monitored. The organ and piano have been tuned. Under Sound System, the lapel microphones have been located. Possibly they will help transmission for the live streaming services. The new computers for the offices have finally been installed, with the glitches worked out by a very competent man. The Trustees have to struggle with AT&T again as they plan a big raise for service and a forced change over to digital from analog. The pressing question is the phone in the elevator that the fire department requires. The first estimate for “pest control” was too expensive to consider. Janet Wahl

**STEWARDSHIP/FINANCE MINISTRY TEAM**

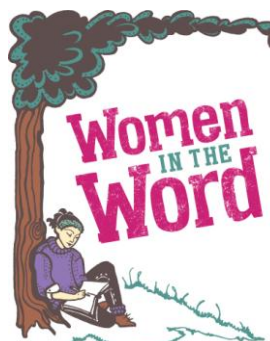

### THE MAYPOLE DANCE

(*The Old Farmer's Almanac 2022*, Robert B. Thomas)

“Did you ever dance around the maypole as a child? Wrapping a maypole with colorful ribbons is a joyous tradition that still exists in some schools and communities.

- ✚ Originally, the maypole was a living tree chosen from the woods with much merrymaking. Ancient Celts danced around the tree, praying for good crops and fertility. For younger people, there was the possibility of courtship. If a young woman and man paired by sundown, their courtship continued so that the couple could get to know each other and, possibly, marry 6 weeks later on June's Midsummer's Day. This is how the 'June sedding' became a tradition.
- ✚ In the Middle Ages, all villages had a maypole. Towns would compete to see who had the tallest or best maypole. Over time, this Old English festival incorporated dance performances, plays, and literature. People would crown a 'May Queen' for the day's festivities.

“The strict Puritans of New England considered the celebrations of May Day to be licentious and pagan, so they forbade its observance, and the springtime holiday never became an important part of American culture as it was in many European countries.

“Interestingly, from the late 19<sup>th</sup> century through the 1950s, the maypole dance and festivities became a rite of spring at some U.S. colleges. Seen as a wholesome tradition, this celebration often included class plays, Scottish dancing, Morris dancing, a cappella concerts, and cultural dancing and music displays.

“In the 1960s and 1970s, interest waned; the May Queen and her court became more of a popularity contest. Today, the maypole dance is mainly celebrated in schools (from elementary through college) as a fun spring activity.”
